Subject: 2012 Regular Legislative Session

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide a summary of education related legislation passed during the regular and special sessions. This information is preliminary because not all bills have been transmitted or signed by the governor.

FY2013 Operating Budget ~ Transmitted to Governor

Conference CS for House Bill 284 contains the department's operating budget for FY2013. Attached is a schedule titled "FY2013 Projected State Program Allocations based on Legislative Appropriations." This schedule totaling \$1.3 billion includes FY2013 estimated funding levels, by district, for the following programs: Foundation (includes Vocational and Technical Adjustment), \$25 million one-time grant funding (funded in the Capital Budget), Boarding Home Stipends, Residential Boarding Program, Youth in Detention, Special Schools, Alaska Challenge Youth Academy, Pupil Transportation, and School Debt Reimbursement. The funding levels listed by district are projected allocations and are subject to change based on actual FY2013 average daily membership and/or individual program requirements.

Included in the foundation projection is the final year of the Education Task Force Recommendations for FY2013 that provides the Area Cost Differential increase from 87.5% to 100% of the ISER study. CCS HB 284 also provides \$3.1 million to the Alaska Performance Scholarship and \$4 million to the Pre-kindergarten grants program which districts apply for through a competitive bid process. In addition, the unexpended and unobligated balance of \$20 million appropriated in FY2011 and FY2012 for EduJobs is reappropriated to the Department of Education & Early Development (DEED) for the EduJobs program in FY2013.

FY2013 Capital Budget ~ Transmitted to Governor

House CS for CS for Senate Bill 160 plus one project funded through the FY2012 Supplemental (CS for HB 307) contains over \$23.9 million in appropriations for the first 14 major maintenance projects and an additional \$1.7 million for deferred maintenance at Mt. Edgecumbe High School. The one page attachment titled, "FY2013 Capital Grants for Schools Districts - Summary," provides details by school district for the major maintenance grants awarded under DEED.

HCS CSSB 160 also includes over \$60 million in appropriations for the renovation and/or replacement of schools in Emmonak and Koliganek.

HCS CSSB 160 also provides \$3 million for Nutritional Alaskan Foods for Schools. One half of the appropriation will be distributed based on the School District Cost Factor and the other half is to be distributed based on a school district's ADM. This program will be administered by the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development. School Districts may be reimbursed for purchases of nutritional Alaskan foods which include:

- · Finfish or shellfish caught or harvested in Alaskan waters
- Livestock raised in Alaska
- · Milk produced from livestock in Alaska
- Fruits or vegetables grown in Alaska
- · Native produce and berries commercially harvested in Alaska
- · Costs of transporting/shipping those goods

FY2012 Supplemental Funding ~ Signed into Law on March 23, 2012

CS for House Bill 307 contains two supplemental appropriations to amend the FY2012 budget. First, funding is provided to the Bethel Campus in the amount of \$5,994,455 to repair water and sewer line in addition to the utilidor. Lastly, the bill provides the DEED with \$18 million to implement, with the Moore collaborative committee, a legal settlement in Moore v. State.

Conference CS for House Bill 104 Alaska Performance Scholarship ~ Awaiting transmittal to Governor

Conference CS for House Bill 104 changes the program name in statute to Alaska Performance Scholarship. Additionally, CCS HB 104 amends AS 14.43.820(a)(3) to allow a scholarship applicant who has completed core academic courses *of high school level* to apply for the scholarship. Programmatic high school level coursework is also outlined within the same statute. The State Board of Education & Early Development, through the regulatory process, will determine how to implement the provision concerning courses of high school level.

Furthermore, CCS HB 104 adds new subsections to AS 14.43.820 by allowing the commissioner to waive a portion of the core academic requirements for not more than 24 additional months after a student graduates from a high school in the state. This provides an applicant the opportunity to complete the academic requirements at a qualified postsecondary institute when circumstances beyond an applicant's control resulted in the inability to meet the requirements within their district.

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Finally, CCS HB 104 establishes the Alaska Performance Scholarship award account, as well as the AlaskaAdvantage education grant fund in order to provide sustainable funding for the scholarship and grant programs.

House CS for CS for Senate Bill 119 Athletic Trainers ~ Awaiting transmittal to Governor House CS for CS for Senate Bill 119 amends AS 14.30.142 to include athletic trainers in evaluating and managing concussions or traumatic brain injuries in student athletes.

Additionally, the legislation requires participation in interscholastic activities be available to a larger number of students who are otherwise not eligible by adding a new section to AS 14.30.365. The eligibility criteria will now include full-time students who are enrolled in grades nine through 12 in an alternative education program that is located entirely in the state. The bill goes on to define alternative education program and provides additional participation criteria.

House CS for Senate Bill 137 Suicide Awareness and Prevention Training – Awaiting transmittal to Governor

House CS for Senate Bill 137 requires public school districts, regional educational attendance areas, and the department to annually provide youth suicide awareness and prevention training, approved by the commissioner, to each teacher, administrator, counselor, and specialist who is employed by the school district or regional educational attendance area. These services are to be provided at no cost to the teacher, administrator, counselor, or specialist. HCS SB 137 specifies standards for training approval by the Commissioner of the DEED. This act will be repealed on July 1, 2016.

House CS for CS for Senate Bill 182 Pupil Transportation / Vocational & Technical Education / Local Contribution / Voluntary Parent & Early Childhood Program ~ Awaiting transmittal to Governor

House CS for CS for Senate Bill 182 addresses four aspects of funding for education: pupil transportation, the vocational and technical education funding factor, local contribution, and Parents as Teachers (PaT).

First, the pupil transportation program will see an increase of approximately \$11.6 million in FY2013. The pupil transportation program will see additional increases of 1.5% in FY2014 and FY2015. Furthermore, there is a FY2012 pupil transportation supplement of approximately \$8.1 million.

Second, the vocational and technical education funding factor will increase from 1.01 in FY2012 to 1.015 beginning FY2013. This additional funding equates to approximately \$5.9 million annually.

Third, HCS CSSB 182 includes a change in the mill rate calculation for the local contribution component of the foundation formula. This section of the legislation shifts a portion of the responsibility for contributions from local municipalities to the state. The shift equates to an additional \$21 million per year from the state. In current law, the 4.0 mills is applied to a discounted Education Value which means only 50% of assessed growth since 1999 is included in the mill rate calculation; this has created different effective mill rates across the state for those

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school districts where local effort is based on the mill rate calculation. This legislation sets the mill rate to 2.65 mills of the True and Full Value.

Finally, HCS CSSB 182 also includes PaT, which is a 3-year pilot Pre-kindergarten (Pre-k) program that includes pre and post student measurements to be reported to the legislature beginning in January 2015. PaT will provide \$3 million per year through a competitive grant process. There is no direct impact on school districts, but rather strengthens the Pre-k component. This program will sunset on July 1, 2015.
