

ALASBO-Reflecting on the Past for the Future

Anchorage was the site of the first official ALASBO meeting in November 1974. The meeting was for two days with 57 people representing 25 districts out of 31. From this beginning ALASBO has been run by volunteers.

The first President elected was Tom Freeman, our Founding Father. As time went on it became obvious that ALASBO was best suited with the purpose to provide leadership through the school business official. The organization always welcomed superintendents and board members that attended the meetings, knowing the intent was for improvement of the business functions supporting the educational process.

Military base schools became regular public schools in 1975. The Regional Education Attendance Areas soon followed with the Molly Hooch case. With this change the number of school districts totaled 52. Providing professional development to the new districts through teaching state and federal compliance, food service management, accounting, custodial and maintenance issues, became the focus of the ALASBO meetings.

ALASBO focused their attention on ASBO as Tom Freeman served on the National Board of Directors of ASBO in 1982 through 1984. As his termed ended he ran for President of ASBO International. It was a great professional and personal experience even though he was not elected.

Through these years ALASBO was involved when a foundation formula was created that stood the test of time for many years and was respected for its fairness. The foundation formula was used for many years until it was changed by Senate Bill 36. ALASBO members have been successfully influential taking on the OASIS project, and several chart of accounts implementations.

ALASBO has maintained a worthy presence on the national and international level. In 2000, the membership decided to run another Alaskan, Melody Douglas of Kenai, for the Board of Directors of ASBO. Several of the original founders of ALASBO directed numerous passionate members to work on the campaigns to not only a successful election to the Board but also to be of service for Melody as President of ASBO International in 2006.

The successful election of Melody Douglas was a direct reflection of ALASBO learning from our founders and taking the steps towards the future. As an organization we are recognized on the international level for our expertise in school business management. Although membership is among the smallest of the states and provinces of North America, over 25% of the Alaskan members of ASBO are involved either on an ASBO International committee (many have chaired these committees over the years) or on review of Meritorious Budget Award and Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting applications.

The following six districts received the Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting for fiscal year 2005: Aleutians East Borough, Anchorage, Bering Strait, Fairbanks North Star Borough, Kenai Peninsula Borough and Southwest Region. The Kenai Peninsula Borough School District also received the Meritorious Budget Award. Two Alaskan members won ASBO scholarships to attend the Annual Conference and four ALASBO members will receive a complimentary one year membership to ASBO.

In 2003 Dave Jones from Kodiak received an ASBO International Eagle Service Award for his contributions to his community. Lucienne Smith from North Slope received an ASBO International Pinnacle of Achievement Award for her district's outsourcing initiative in 2006. These awards are the highest honors to be received by school business officials.

On a State level we continue to provide professional development to school business office staff at our annual meetings. ALASBO offers the district's staff a network to assist in the support of the educational process. This includes a board liaison assigned to each district and the camaraderie we have built over the years. Since 1999 ALASBO has celebrated the success of our members by presenting the School Business Official of the Year award.



Looking toward the future, ALASBO has held two summer leadership conferences focusing on

We met in Juneau for our annual ALASBO Fly-In from April 11 to April 13, 2007.

Eddy Jeans and the folks at the Department of Education hosted us in the State Board Room on Wednesday. We started the day by having Carl Rose, AASB Executive Director, brief us on the legislative session to date in regards to education issues. We then had Mary Francis, ACSA Executive Director give us her perspectives on educational issues on the hill. Last but not least, Eddy Jeans talked to us about some of the items that were being discussed and looked at as potential funding mechanisms for the FY08 school year.

Member Spotlight: Edith Hildebrand

For this quarter's edition of the "Member Spotlight" feature, Chad Stiteler has picked Edith Hildebrand for the spotlight!

Tell us about your school district – The Yukon Koyukuk School District

- serves over 1200 students K 12
- has schools that range from 10-70+ students
- has a total of 11 schools (including 9 rural schools, 1 correspondence school, and 1 charter school)
- has an annual budget of over \$12 million.

How long have you been in school business? 2 years.

How did you get into this business? From a small community of less than 100 in interior Alaska, I transferred to a bigger school 18 miles down the river because my home school only went to the 10th grade. I graduated from high school, way back "when" and met my future husband there. I spent a few years in college, attaining my BBA in Business Management from UAA, followed by 10 yrs working for non-profit organizations, primarily in Human Resources. The 8+ years in HR (both in Fairbanks & Kotzebue) were very challenging, but I loved the field. I moved over to UAF for a couple years as a mini grants manager. I decided to take advantage of the tuition waiver and went fulltime for two years to get a long-distance Masters Degree in Rural Development with a focus on Youth Education. 
