An item raising concern related to legislative interaction is Ballot Measure 1 on the August

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primary ballot, the so called Anti-Corruption Act which has also become known as the "Gag Rule". This measure potentially prohibits and in some cases makes it a crime to lobby the state legislature if you or anyone in your extended family works for, contracts with or provides services for pay to government entities or participates in any activity funded by federal or state dollars. This is a large list of people in Alaska who could no longer communicate with legislators, severely limiting the voice of the people in the governmental process.

ALASBO's legislative efforts as well as school employees' efforts are among those potentially banned from lobbying. The ALASBO board will review the issue at our June meeting and may issue a resolution against Measure 1.

Please take a few minutes to review the ballot measure and plan to vote in the August election. Some informative websites include:

# Executive Director's Message

All in Juneau are breathing a sigh of relief; the legislators have left town! Now, the first cruise ships have arrived, a sure sign that summer is just around the corner.

ALASBO members were "on the hill" during our **Legislative Fly-In**, March 31-April 2. Our group of six members first met with staff from EED, AASB and ACSA to develop Talking Points, which are available on our website, <a href="https://www.alasbo.org">www.alasbo.org</a>, under news. Over the next two days, we split into teams, visiting 28 offices. We

saw the legislators at least half the time, meeting with staff to review our Talking Points and answer questions when the legislators were swamped with late-in-session business. Several of us were also able to testify on HB317, a bill that called for increases to the base student allocation and the block grant for FY12 and FY13.

Unfortunately, HB317 did not pass. However, it was a good year for education overall, with significant funding for capital projects, though these bills are still awaiting approval by the Governor and by the voters, in the case of the statewide bond proposals. A summary of the session results will be available shortly from the EED.

Over the summer, you can expect to see candidates touring your districts. Be sure to ask them their position on education funding. Take the opportunity to explain how the multi-year plan for funding the base student allocation in FY09-FY11 added stability to education funding in Alaskan school districts and enabled administrators to keep the focus on educational programs. Since FY11 was the last year of the 3-year BSA increases and HB317 did not pass, we will once again be in the unfortunate situation of not knowing the FY12 BSA level until next spring. Let's advocate for action early in the next session!

In February, I attended the **ASBO Leadership Conference** in Orlando, along with a group of about eight ALASBO members. This conference featured world-class management training by the Disney Institute. Those of you attending the ASBO Annual Conference in September will have an opportunity to access this training. The conference also included a meeting of the Affiliate Executive Directors Group (AEDG), where I have a chance to pick up valuable information from my colleagues working in other state ASBO affiliates.

Believe it or not, we are already planning for the annual conference in December! As in the past, intensive program planning will take place at our **Summer Leadership Conference**, July 30-August 1 in Wrangell. Review my separate

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article for additional information about Summer Leadership! This year's focus will be on responding to the **member survey of professional development needs** that is currently in process through June 15.

# REFLECTIONS ON THE LEGISLATIVE FLY-IN

The Legislative Fly-In held a few surprises for me. For years there have been two people who serve as Wrangell Public Schools district office support staff. There is a very capable administrative assistant/board secretary and a business manager/fiscal officer. Our duties are split as follows: the admin assistant does words and I do numbers. We just hired a part-time person who may become a more well rounded employee, as she helps both of us complete the work. Serving on the board of ALASBO requires one newsletter item, so here's my best shot at "doing words".

In April, right before the legislature finished for the year, ALASBO lobbied for education issues. We shared our stories and insights with the representatives and the senators who make the decisions for Alaska. We began each meeting by saying "thank you" for the way funding has been done for the last few years, through the multi-year Base Student Allocation commitment. It has made our budget process much easier. We then talked about the needs of students and school maintenance.

The people we met were of diverse backgrounds and had their own stories and insights. They asked us some hard questions about dropout rates. Several asked what we were doing to lower the dropout rate, and if our superintendents worked together to find a solution to lower the rate. We spent a lot of time both talking and listening. I love the diversity of human beings. I love seeing how we use our talents to achieve success, whether it is success in business, family, or friendships. # Your Moment of EXCEL Zen TROUBLE ALIGNING EXCEL CURRENCY SYMBOLS

When I'm working with numbers in Accounting format, if all the numbers are the same length, the currency symbols line up nicely. However, if the numbers are different lengths, some of the symbols are a bit off.

For example, in the screen shot below, the \$ sign in cell B4 is a bit to the right of the symbol in B5. It's not much, but it looks sloppy, and some fonts show the effect more obviously than others. I added the blue line to make it easier to see the variations in column B.




But...I was determined to find a fix. I just knew that there had to be a way to get what I wanted, how I wanted it.

Finally after another attempt at lining up the dollar signs, I found the solution to the uncooperative dollar signs! I checked the horizontal alignment for the cells, and discovered that I had them formatted as Right aligned.

I clicked the button at the bottom right of the Alignment group on the Ribbon's Home tab, to open the Format Cells dialog box.



(For you keyboard short cut commandos, Ctl + 1 will open the Format Cells dialog box)



Then, on the Alignment tab, I changed the Horizontal alignment to General, and clicked OK. And... "Tada!", all the dollar signs lined up, without a single dollar sign out of place, even with the different font and sizes.
